# Interview with Robert Barry By Squadron Staff



## What is your role in the Air Training Corps?

I joined the Squadron about 9 months ago and since then my role on the Squadron has evolved. I suppose I could be called the Flight Simulator Training Coordinator. I had heard from the Commanding Officer that the Squadron simulators were out of action so I volunteered to help restore them to operation. # Fieldcraft - Cadet Krunity-Salako

With the squadron I went on an overnight exercise a few months ago. It was in a local forest. We did a shooting exercise, and a camouflage exercise which included applying camo cream, hiding, and leopard crawling. It was a good experience because we did most of the tasks independently. I had never been on a fieldcraft exercise and I found it to be a great experience.







#### Walking and Duke of Edinburgh Programme

2019 saw the development of the Squadron walking and Duke of Edinburgh programme start to take shape and we now have staff trained and ready to develop this further for our cadets into 2020.

#### Lacock Walk - Cadet Boulton

We walked to Lacock in October to practice for Duke of Edinburgh. We started at the squadron building in a mild drizzle, and split into teams of two. These teams would be navigating the group to the next point.

The route had about 9 segments: through the trading estate, through some housing, past the fields where the fireworks are held, detouring through some other fields, then coming out near the roundabout near the Taylor Wimpey houses, following the road up the back route to Lacock, through a sweetcorn field, across some ditches, under barbed wire, through some slushy ground, over the Lacock bridge, and into the minibus.

My favourite part was running through the corn fields that towered over even Dan while the heavens opened up. We also came across a wire fence which might have been electrified and led to an intense crossing which cut close to sensitive areas when sweeping legs over. Thankfully nobody chanced it. Before this, CI Fielding taught us how to take a bearing to find the correct direction to head with a map, compass, and a landmark. Seeing the bridge was a relief but I started to see the walk as a good start to more challenging walks and a real accomplishment. One thing that needs to be explained to me is why my feet were steaming when I changed shoes yet it was freezing!



# Practising for Duke of Edinburgh Bonze award – Cadet

Today, 21 cadets ran laps of 20 metres in 2 minutes, situps, ball bounces, and one-legged squats. After that we all did push-ups in a line. #### **Camps**

#### **HMS Bristol Camp - Cadet Hiscocks**

On the 3rd to the 6th October 2019, I went with two other cadets from Melksham Squadron to Portsmouth on the HMS Bristol Camp. Our days on camp consisted of visiting museums including the submarine museum and the Portsmouth Historic Dockyard. Staying on a Type 80 destroyer was an exhilarating experience. I really enjoyed my time there and would definitely return.

#### **RIAT - Corporal Tate**

At the end of July, 4 other cadets and I went on a camp based around helping the smooth running of the Royal International Air Tattoo. Through this 6 day camp, we were split into flights all named after aircraft, with 15-20 in each flight in order to help with jobs around the 3-day show. Some of these jobs ranged from VIP duty, where we had to check passes and help VIPs around the venue, to crowd lining, where we went past the barrier that stops spectators from obstructing the runway. On arrival we had to attend a pre-camp safety brief, then were issued with two RIAT 2019 t-shirts and a RIAT cap to wear, then we had free time until lights out at 2100. We were ready for breakfast at 0600, and this continued throughout the 6

days of the camp until the final Tuesday.

#### **Shooting Camp - Cadet Foster**

In the summer we went to Salisbury Plain for a shooting camp. We travelled down there on the Friday, and were allocated our billets. There was a sense of excitement in the air as we had our first meal. That night was cold and wet! We woke at 0545 due to the noisy Cadet Warrant Officer slamming the cupboard. We got up and it was freezing as we went to the showers. We all got given a L98 and went into the classroom to be trained.



It was intense training, and also really tricky as we had our smocks and webbing on. We had 2 days of training and then we were able to fire our rifles. We went to Warminster in a convoy of minibuses. We were issued our rifles, did the safety precautions, then split into groups – I was in the third group. We waited for the first rounds to echo around as the rifles fired, and a rush of adrenaline went through us! It was our turn next – we walked up to the range with our rifles. The instructor told us to load, then we slowly pulled the trigger – boom! The target was hit, a cloud of smoke went into the air! It was a fantastic week.

#### **Cosford Camp, Cpl Price**

On the 26th October at 0900, I was waiting at a bus stop in Lyneham for a coach to pick me up to take me to Cosford. We arrived after a journey of around 2 hours at RAF Cosford in dismal weather, but there was a very happy atmosphere. We were issued our rooms and took our bags upstairs to our respective rooms. I was sharing with another Cpl, and we got on really well. We did a variety of activities on and off camp, including going to an aircraft museum and a major memorial site.
